Understanding Medicaid Managed Care

What is Medicaid Managed Care?

Medicaid Managed Care is a redesign of Medicaid services to better support Youth and Families in the community.

Services are provided through a Medicaid Managed Care Plan (MMCP)

Most children/youth receiving Medicaid are already enrolled in a MMCP, but some services are not yet covered by their plan and are covered by regular Medicaid

Some children/youth:

- Must enroll in a Medicaid Managed Care Plan.
- May enroll in a Medicaid Managed Care Plan but do not have to.
- Cannot enroll in a Medicaid Managed Care Plan. Their services are paid through regular Medicaid.

How do I get a MMCP?

When its time to pick a plan, families will get a letter with instructions and will have 60 days to choose a plan.

Help keep children and youth with complex health or mental health needs in their home and community

What are Children's Home and Community Based Services (HCBS)?

Can be provided where children/youth and families/caregivers are most comfortable - at home or in the community

Support children and youth as they work toward goals and achievements to be successful at home, in school, and in other environments

Offer individual, flexible services to meet the health, mental health, and/or developmental needs of each child/youth

Children and Family Treatment and Support Services (CFTSS)

Children & **Family Treatment &** Support **Services (CFTSS)** Highlights

Services for children/youth with Medicaid (under the age of 21) who may be experiencing mental health or substance use needs

Can be provided at home or in the community, outside of an office setting

Support families and help them make informed decisions about their youth's care to improve their health, well-being and quality of life.

Meet the individual needs of children and their families/caregivers by:

- Identifying mental health and/ or substance use needs early
- Providing support in the home and community
- Preventing the need for emergency room visits, hospital stays, or out of home placements

Referral

Anyone can make a referral for services, but the determination for access to ("recommendation") and service component (provision) must be made by a licensed practitioner who can determine and document medical necessity.

Needs can be identified by multiple sources including:

- parents and other caregivers
- pediatricians
- Therapist
- County worker (case manager, SPOA, etc.)
- care managers
- school personnel (social worker or counselor)
- or the young people themselves



Recommendation

To get a recommendation a licensed practitioner needs to identify and document that access to these services and their components are needed (i.e.; medical necessity)

This evaluation process is based on a completed assessment. The recommendation must be in writing and include an explanation of the medical need for the service.

Medical Necessity

In order for family and youth to access these services their needs must be deemed medically necessary

Medically necessary means health care and services that are necessary to prevent, diagnose, manage or treat conditions in the person that cause acute suffering, endanger life, result in illness or infirmity, interfere with such person's capacity for normal activity, or threaten some significant handicap.

(N.Y. Soc. Serv. Law, § 365-a).

Each new State Plan Service will have specific guidelines.

Medical Necessity Form - LPHA Recommendation for Children & Family Treatment & Support Services

(<u>NOT A REQUIRED FORM.</u> This form is NOT required to be used, but a sample template to capture the information necessary to demonstrate medical necessity.)

Instructions: This form can only be completed and signed by a Licensed Practitioner of the Healing Arts (Individual currently licensed as a Registered Professional Nurse, Nurse Practitioner, Psychiatrist, Licensed Psychologist, Licensed Psychologist, Licensed Psychologist, Licensed Psychologist, Licensed Master Social Worker, Licensed Clinical Social Worker, Licensed Marriage & Family Therapist, Licensed Mental Health Counselor, or Licensed Creative Arts Therapist, or Physician).

Other Licensed Practitioner (OLP)

What it is:

Treatment services for mental health and substance use needs by *licensed* professionals.

These professionals start the process – they do the **assessment**, **determine medical necessity** and make the **recommendation** for services.


What it includes:

- Licensed Evaluation/Assessment
- Treatment Planning
- Psychotherapy
- Crisis Intervention

Other Licensed Practitioner (OLP)

Who is an Other Licensed Practitioner?

*Note: These practitioners must operate within a designated agency

- Physician
- Licensed Creative Arts Therapist
- Licensed Psychoanalyst*
- Physician's Assistant

CPST

Community Psychiatric Support and Treatment

Community Psychiatric Support and Treatment (CPST)

What it is:

Services provided to young people and their families in the community instead of an office setting to help build self-care and daily living skills. It is intended to assist young people and their family/caregivers with stability and support to function within their natural environment.

What it includes:

- odaily living
- opersonal recovery and/or resilience
- o family and interpersonal relationships in school and community integration.

Psychosocial Rehabilitation Supports (PSR)

What it is:

Services designed to restore, rehabilitate and support a youth as an active and productive member of their family and community.

Activities are:

- hands on and task oriented
- focused on rehabilitative needs of the youth
- Can also be provided in coordination with treatment interventions by a licensed provider

FPSS

Family Peer Support Services (Expanding in July 2019)

Family Peer Support Services (FPSS)

What it is:

Families can get support from a peer with lived experience if they are raising a child who is experiencing social, emotional, medical, developmental, substance use, and/or behavioral challenges.

What it includes:

FPSS provides a structured, strength-based relationship between a Family Peer Advocate (FPA) and the parent/caregiver for the benefit of the child.

FPSS are array of formal and informal activities and supports provided to families caring for/raising the youth

*The term 'family" is defined as the primary caregiving unit and is inclusive of the wide diversity of primary caregiving units.

Youth Peer Support and Training (YPST)

What it is:

Youth who are experiencing social, medical, emotional, developmental, substance use, and/or behavioral challenges in home, school, placement, and/or community can receive support from a **peer with similar experiences** to set goals and develop community living skills.

What it includes:

An array of formal and informal services and supports provided by a peer with lived experience to young people to expand the skills and strategies needed to move forward in meeting their personal, individualized life goals, develop self-advocacy skills, and support their transition into adulthood.


Crisis Intervention (CI)


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
Mobile services provided to young people who need **immediate support** to address personal distress and develop skills to minimize or prevent crises in the future.

These are provided by the clinician and are designed to address acute distress and associated behaviors when the child/youth's condition requires immediate attention due to an unplanned event that requires a rapid response.

^{*}Crisis services need not be anticipated in the treatment plan
